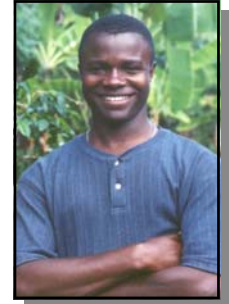

In September of 2003, he began his study at Kilimanjaro Christian Medical College to train as a physician. Daniel is now in his fourth year of this five year program leading to an M.D. degree. He has been at the top of his class throughout his study at KCMC. He hopes to continue his education following graduation to become a surgeon.

Calvin, 25, also hails from Machame Village and is in his fourth year of five at Kilimanjaro Christian Medical College. He, too, has been at the top of his class throughout his study at KCMC. He hopes to specialize in OB-GYN because he recognizes the great need for women's health care in Tanzania. He writes, "*I wish to become a doctor, so that I can serve lives of people in my country who are dying simply because of ignorance. I will tell them possible causes, preventative measures, control and treatment of diseases.*"

Daniel and Calvin are both extremely talented and hard-working young men who want to serve their country as physicians. To be a doctor in East Africa is an enormously challenging profession. The difficulties facing Tanzania in all areas of health care are daunting to say the least. The AIDS pandemic, malaria, a great many diseases related to malnutrition and the appalling lack of medical care (one physician for every 25,000 people) are among those challenges. The Promissory Note our medical school students sign, ensures they will spend at least five years serving the people of Tanzania before considering any other options. Of course, Daniel and Calvin are committed to serving in Tanzania throughout their careers.

Thank you for giving consideration to assisting Daniel and Calvin to complete their education. Without the American God Parent Scholarship Foundation, it is highly unlikely that either of them would be able to attend school and certainly not medical school. The average family income in Tanzania is less than a dollar a day. Costs at Kilimanjaro Christian Medical College, including tuition, books, supplies and living expenses are approximately \$8,000 for 2007. It is only because caring Americans have pledged to be sponsors that the dream of becoming physicians is within the grasp of these dedicated and motivated young men.
